As we moved towards a hybrid worship and community, the FUMCAH website has become an important point of contact between the church, the congregation, and the community. Here are a few pages to check out:



A Year of New Beginnings

In the wearying flux of our "comeback year," one thing has become abundantly clear. New beginnings are messy! What great energy we had to kick off the year! VBS, a packed youth kick-off, multitudinous meetings, bold ideas, shifts in philosophy, you name it! We were in it. And then life (re: COVID, winter, etc.) hits and knocks you around a little, jumbles things up and scatters that energy.

This has been an emotionally challenging year for me. I've lamented publicly that I still don't even know what most of you fully look like. I've struggled with the disconnect of serving a community in which my family and I are not living. I've felt mired in a spiritual dry spell, finding some, but little, solace in the words of the Psalmist, "How long, LORD? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me?" And yet, just as a seed must be buried and die before it produces new life, I cling to that perennial hope of winter: that spring always comes around. There are good, fresh, and beautiful things, both now and on the horizon.

We've re-established a regular rhythm for all our youth (6th-12th grades) to come and do life together. A place to shed all the defense mechanisms that we gather in a world that can be cruel and encourage each other to pick up the cross of Jesus that extends love and blessing to others. This community is growing stronger week by week, and we've had fruitful conversations about the Bible, justice, and the big questions of identity and purpose. We've also been struggling together to confess the damage being done by colonialism and extractive capitalism while trying to figure out how to hold on to hope in this humanity that God so loves. And yes, it's been hard and awkward at times, but such is the messiness of new beginnings!

We affirmed our commitment to ASP (Appalachia Service Project) and are excited to explore where and to whom our other mission endeavors will take us in future years. We are in the conception stage of imagining what a new high school music ministry will look like - perhaps a worship band with singers & instrumentalists experiencing that transcendence that can come when we lose ourselves in music made for God's glory. We are excited to reconnect with the earth - to the clay from which we were formed, finding ways to cultivate abundance from its potential, limit the harm we do, and slowly undo the curse of climate catastrophe - the messiest of new beginnings.

The future is bright because it is God's. And as people who belong to God, I invite you to open up your imagination with us and be present as we stumble together through this season into God's promised, abundant reality. For Christ is with us, therefore we have all we need to make it happen.

Our Missions Committee and the FUMCAH family are living the words of this hymn. The pictures from the airport in Kabul last year were heartbreaking. The images, coupled with the words of fear and despair we heard from those attempting to leave Afghanistan, were reminders of the worldwide plight of refugees. Worldwide, thousands of children spend their formative years in a refugee camp. Our Missions Committee responded by forming RAFT, the Refugee Assistance and Friendship Team. This small group decided to co-sponsor a refugee family with RefugeeOne, and officially announced the project in early December.

As we explored the theme of "finding home" during Advent, the RAFTers actively raised money for rent support, gathered furnishings for an apartment, and sought mentors to work with the family - so that a family, our "neighbors from far away," could be warmly welcomed to their new home. That first team of Wendy Dunnington, Greg and Dale Ford, Jean Wood, and Lou Walton has since expanded to include many more persons from the church and community. In less than two months, our initial fund-raising goal was met, furniture and household goods have been gathered, and our mentor team is anxious to meet the family.

It was only last fall that the small team from the Missions Committee began actively exploring what would be involved in co-sponsoring a refugee family and so much has been accomplished. The spirit of generosity and hospitality is alive and well at FUMCAH. I wonder where God might be leading us next as we seek to love boldly.

Incremental | Monumental

As we continue to worship through the changes and challenges that the pandemic has brought, I would like to highlight the work that the Worship Tech Team has helped us accomplish. When we first came back to in-person Sunday services in June of 2021, we jumped on Zoom as a church. This was done with donated phones throughout the Sanctuary acting as cameras. Many thanks to Jim Petrusek, Terri Passolt, Jim and Susan Abdnor, and Lauren Johnson for the phones. Christina Rice continued her role as Media Assistant, bringing an astounding attention to detail and care for the final look and sound of the services. The two of us controlled the Zoom meeting, streamed the meeting to YouTube, mixed the sound, projected the slides, and controlled the lighting. What a joy to be together in real-time, instead of pre-recording and editing every word and every frame! One thing we learned quickly was that we needed to make the service more accessible, more consistent, and more authentic for the congregants at home as well as in the Sanctuary.

When the Rob Roy Parsonage was sold, funds were designated for improving online and hybrid worship, and we were able to invest in a set of Mevo cameras and an iPad to control them. This advancement coincided with the official formation of the Worship Tech Team, as Sam Williams volunteered to help with running the increasingly complex technology needs of a Sunday service. The team has expanded to include Lauren Johnson, Matthew Jones, Shane Sutton, and Julianne Conlee with additional support from Chad Sutton, Mike Schellinger, and Ben Hallett. Incremental changes lead to monumental improvements: a typical service currently consists of two iPads, three cameras, twenty microphones, two independent audio mixes (in-room and online), and over sixty projected slides. We stream directly to YouTube and embed the video on the FUMCAH website.

YouTube was chosen as our host due to it being a v i d e o - f o c u s e d platform that is easily accessible on computers, tablets, smartphones, and



smart TVs. Not everyone at home has the same access to modern devices or the technical skills to see and hear the services clearly. Lauren Johnson thinks that something we do well is "making sure everyone, including those at home, can see and hear the service," and Matthew Jones says, "I think we have a strong online presence that really reaches out to new people." Reaching and supporting everyone where they are is one of our primary goals.
